Re: Support for HB 212

Dear Chairman Foil,

On behalf of the Louisiana Society of Addiction Medicine (LSAM), the medical specialty society representing physicians and other clinicians in Louisiana who specialize in the prevention and treatment of addiction, I would like to express our support for HB 212. This important legislation would remove fentanyl test strips (FTS) from drug paraphernalia classification under state law. With opioid-involved deaths in Louisiana increasing, due primarily to the proliferation of fentanyl, it is vital that our citizens have access to proper testing equipment that can save lives.

According to a recent legal analysis, it is clearly legal to possess fentanyl test strips and other drug testing equipment in 22 states. Additionally, in 14 states drug testing equipment is legal only if the materials are distributed from a certified syringe service program. Discrepancies of this nature can cause confusion about the true legality of fentanyl test strips and restrict their availability. Therefore, it is recommended that states clarify their laws to ensure that fentanyl test strips are clearly excluded from drug paraphernalia classification. The enactment of HB 212 would accomplish this aim in Louisiana.
